2. Tell us why did you choose law?

Law was one of the most interesting, intellectually stimulating and challenging career options when I chose it and continues to be more so in today's world. The profession is quite democratic as well – your hard work can make you successful and take you to any heights. I was quite inquisitive, a reasonably good wordsmith and interested in doing something very different – although my family expected me to be a CA, given my proficiency at Maths and Accounts.

3. What made you choose corporate law as your practice in particular?

As I mentioned earlier, I wanted to do something different. Litigation was oh so common and ordinary. The corporate world and the changing Indian economy (after liberalisation in 1991) excited me. I wanted to track and be in sync with the changing India, different from what may be 98% or more of law graduates was doing. And the rest, as they say, is history !

4. What suggestions would you like to give our first generation lawyers after completion of their 3 years / 5 years undergraduate law course?

See what have you done, where are you going, are you employable ?

My friends, the real world is different from what you get to see and learn in law college, moot courts and internships. You must know that in today's world, Knowledge is power, add skills to it. Here, by knowledge I mean a reasonable mix of theoretical and practical aspects. Knowing law is good, how to translate into practice is the key to a successful career. Therefore, be hungry be foolish about knowledge and get it from wherever you can get it when you are in law school. Be alert, be resourceful..

5. According to you, how do you think participating in competitions alongwith internships can be beneficial for law student?

Competitions add spice to your learning and prep you up, supplementing your legal knowledge and internship experience. You learn to be vocal, visible, assertive, confident, team player and what not. Your research, analytical and writing / speaking skills are put to test – the rigour drives you nuts at times, but worth it. You learn a lot of practical traits as you are guided and groomed at times by senior academics and professionals associated with such competitions.

6. How do you describe the life of a corporate lawyer after so much of experience?

It's a roller coaster ride every day. Lot of work, team work, management, business promotion, networking, reading, researching, guiding, mentoring, meetings, calls, negotiations, drafting, review, guest lectures and what not. Life is very hectic, exciting, challenging, full of curiosity, anxiousness, uncertainty. You have to throw multiple balls in the air and make sure none falls.

7. How do you manage to teach students, write books and practicing as Managing Partner at Corp Comm Legal despite having a busy schedule?

The key lies in prioritizing different aspects of your life. If you enjoy what you are doing, it doesn't seem like work ever. You look forward to it more than ever before. I have a very good team at my disposal – they manage a lot of things so well that I can spare some time to follow my passion.

Having said that, I have a tough time managing too many invites for guest lectures, bootcamps, judging competitions and so on.

8. What is your take on all time dispute going on between NLU Students and Non- NLU Students while applying for jobs?

Nothing can stop you, if you have it in you – NLU / non-NLU, metro / non-metro, English / Vernacular, these differences vanish after a while. Only the fit survive the competition.

You would have seen so many star kids doing well and many of them not doing too well. What's the difference ?

NLU and family background may give you a kickstart but can't be with you forever. Ultimately, you will be recognised for the quality, timing and pricing of your services – a good mix of these aspects.

I am so happy to see many non-NLU graduates hitting the top, securing good placements, doing well on their own and even becoming partners at some of the global law firms.

The important thing is that you should aspire to reach the top – take the stairs, if you don't get the lift.

9. Do you find something funny about legal profession?

Lawyers are badly needed but seldom loved. The public perception is quite negative about the profession. People assume that a lawyer would be argumentative, unreasonable, will be on wrong side of the law (take advantage of imaginary loopholes) and so on.

Our society needs lawyers to defend every section of the society but no one loves lawyers – be it landlords, neighbours, banks, prospective in-laws. Police and lawyers are two professions strongly detested for a company, isn't it?

People do not know that you don't need lawyers only when you get in trouble, you need lawyers even to avoid disputes – be it agreements or dispute resolution clauses.

10. What life lesson would you like to share with our young minds?

Believe in yourself, respect yourself. If you don't do that, no one else will.

Winter Online Internship Program, 2021 (February month)

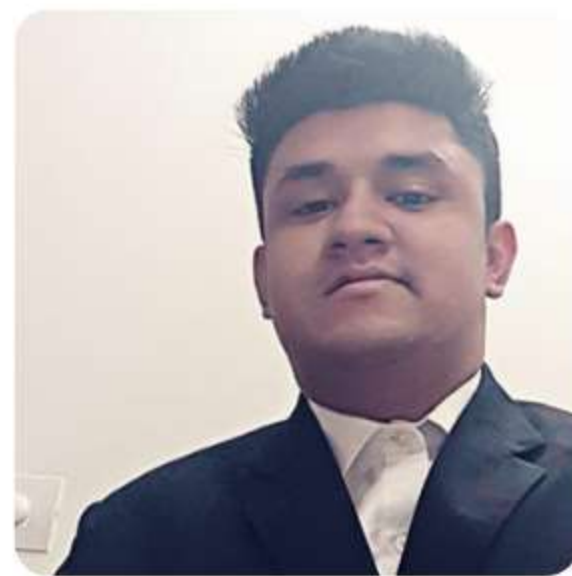

As per Rule 25 of Bar Council of India, provides that each registered student shall have completed minimum of 12 weeks internship for 3-year course stream and 20 weeks in case of 5-year course stream during the entire period of legal studies. It would be one month full Internship program. Internship certificate will be issued on the successfully completion of Internship as per the Bar Council of India rules.
